





Help 4-H Members Thrive Through Positive Emotionality

4-H is based on a positive youth development approach that recognizes all youth have interests, abilities and strengths that can be enhanced by participation in a high quality 4-H program. Research

consistently shows that participation in quality 4-H programs increases thriving in youth. Thriving youth achieve important developmental outcomes such as academic motivation and achievement. Thriving youth are positive and optimistic and are able to



A major factor in thriving youth is the embrace of positive emotionality. Positive emotionality is learning to manage emotions effectively and something all youth need to accomplish in order to thrive. Youth can be a volatile time in an individual's life. Emotions that arise from events that are disappointing, frustrating, or unfair can be quite strong. Youth engaged in 4-H programming need to learn positive ways to express their emotions rather than hiding their feelings or expressing them in negative ways.

Research shows that helping young people develop reappraisal skills can give our youth the tools they need to manage strong emotions effectively. These reappraisal skills will help youth explore their powerful emotions rather than suppress them. Youth will learn to redirect their negative emotions into positive responses. Emotional management is part of emotional intelligence. Emotional intelligence is a key social skill needed throughout life. Daniel Goleman, author of **Emotional Intelligence**, explains:

"The emotional brain responds more quickly than the thinking brain. If you are not able to manage your distressing emotions, if you can't have empathy and effective relationships, then no matter how smart you are, you are not going to get very far."

People who have a high level of emotional intelligence are able to relate positively with others

through appropriate interactions. They gain the trust of others while making their peers feel valued. Children with well-developed emotional intelligence skills tend to have greater success in school and healthier relationships.

Youth who participate in 4-H have the opportunity to increase

their emotional intelligence, as the 4-H youth development program is designed to build a child's emotional intelligence by developing life skills such as responsibility, listening, teamwork and modeling.

For parents, volunteer leaders and staff, below are some suggestions to help youth develop positive emotionality:

- Assure youth that their feelings matter. Support their feelings as valid.
- Teach youth that while all feelings are valid, everyone needs to learn to manage their emotions effectively.
- Encourage youth to express their feelings when they try to suppress them.
- Help youth to develop reappraisal skills by pointing out other sides to the situation and encourage perspective taking.
- Have clear expectations for expressing strong emotions appropriately in the 4-H setting.
- Notice youth who struggle with emotional management and guide them toward a more positive expression.

On Wednesday, March 18, the University of Georgia Extension 4-H Program Started making delivering daily 4-H activities. These lessons on a host of topics, including agriculture, health and wellness, snack ideas and community service projects, are being emailed daily, Wednesdays will be dedicated to healthy living topics prepared by Burke County UGA Extension Family and Consumer Science Agent Terri Black.

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The daily activities can be completed at home with common household items. The free lessons are geared for youth ages five to 18 and 4-H membership is not required.

The UGA Extension agents plan to send out the lessons at least through April 30.

Washoe County 4-H Horse Program and BLM Collaborate on Wild Horse Training

The Bureau of Land Management (BLM), Nevada State Office and the University of Nevada, Reno, Extension Washoe 4-H Youth Development Program are working together to offer an educational opportunity and fundraiser for Nevada 4-H Horse Clubs. The purpose of this partnership program is twofold; to increase awareness and promote successful adoptions of mustangs and to build horsemanship and life skills for 4-H members.

Four wild horses and one wild burro, all yearlings, were picked up from the Palomino Valley Center by 4-H Horse club members during the week of March 16, 2020.

(Note that all safe practices and social distancing for the Coronavirus were followed during the process.)

They will spend the spring and early summer raising and training the animals, On Sunday, July 26, 2020, the 4-H clubs/members will show the mustangs in a "Trail Challenge" during the Carson City Fair. The process will finish with the auction of three of the horses. One horse and the burro will be adopted by their trainers.

Proceeds from the auction will be used to expand the wild horse and burro program to other 4-H members in Nevada Counties.

NJLS Update: Where it Stands

One of the questions being asked lately is whether or not there will be a Nevada Junior Livestock Show. The simple answer is no one knows yet. With Extension offices and 4-H clubs closed until April 20 during the Coronavirus shutdown, and debates about whether that date will be moved, making a definite plan can be difficult.

Although the May 6-10 show dates are well after the current restart date of April 20, there have been concerns about travel to the show, social dis-

tancing while there and the exposure of higher risk individuals (older family members) in a crowd setting.

The NJLS Board has been having special meetings to address these issues. At the next Zoom meeting on April 1, the agenda includes a COVID-19 update and its effect on the 2020 Show and Sale; and possible changes or alternatives to it.

Any changes to the scheduled event will be communicated to all involved parties. In the meantime, participants should operate under the assumption that the show will continue as planned until told otherwise.
