

# 2020-2021 4-H Attendance and Evaluation Report

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#### Introduction

The Clark County 4-H Plan provides a vision and outlines goals to expand and support national and state priorities in Clark County. - ✓ For race, 17% of participants were Asian, 6% were Black or African American, 40% were Caucasian, 31% were Multiracial, and 6% did not provide race data.

- ✓ Gender data shows that 43% of attendants were male, 53% were female, and 2% did not disclose this information.
- ✓ Ethnicity data shows that 56% of attendants were Hispanic or Latinx, 5% were non-Hispanic or Latinx, 35% did not know their ethnicity, and 5% of chose not to disclose this information.
- ✓ For race, 2% of attendants were American Indian or Alaskan Natives, 7% were Asian, 2% were Black or African American, 5% were Caucasian, 7% were Multiracial, 6% did not know their race, and 40% chose not to disclose this information.

- ✓ For ethnicity, 90% of participants were Hispanic or Latinx and the remaining were non-Hispanic or Latinx.
- ✓ For race, 10% were American Indian or Alaskan Native, 10% were Black or African American, and the remaining 80% were Caucasian.

# Youth Thriving & Developmental Context Survey Results

Three different surveys were administered, based on the number of sessions youth attended. The Youth Thriving Survey was given to youth who attended a minimum of 5 sessions. For youth aged 13 and above, the survey was a post-reflective survey. A post Developmental Context Survey was given to youth who attended between 2-4 sessions. A short satisfaction survey was given to youth who attended a 1-time session. The following is a summary of the collected data.

# **<u>1 Session Satisfaction Survey Results</u>**

Through the 2020-2021 4-H year, 53 participants attended a 1-time program and provided evaluation survey feedback. Of these participants, 45% were male, 45% were female, 2% did not want to say, and 11% provided no answer. For ethnicity, 30% of participants were Hispanic or Latinx, 43% were non-Hispanic or Latinx, 17% did not know their ethnicity, and the remaining 14% chose not to disclose this information. For race, 11% of participants were Asian, 19% were Black or African American, 25% were Caucasian, 19% were Multiracial, 11% did not know their race, and 15% chose not to provide this data.

One-time session survey results indicate that of the 53 total participants, 96% loved the content and activities carried out in their 4-H workshop. 91% of participants wanted to learn more about topics covered in their respective 4-H session. 75% of participants felt that the content and skills learned in their workshop were important and relevant to their lives, while 17% were unsure.



92% of participants felt welcomed in their 4-H workshop while 2% were unsure and another 2% decided not to answer this question. 83% of participants felt that the adults in their 4-H workshops helped them see new opportunities while 4% were unsure, 6% did not understand the question, and 2% chose not to respond.

## 2-4 Session Developmental Context Survey Results

Overall, 3 participants attended the 2-4 session 4-H workshops in the 2020-2021 year. Of these 3 participants, 100% were male. 66% were non-Hispanic or Latinx, while 33% did not know how to report ethnicity. For race, 100% of participants were Asian.

For the 2-4 session classes, 100% of participants were interested in learning more about the topics of interest in their respective workshops, though 66% also indicated that class content was not interesting to them, respectively. 100% of participants shared that they felt welcomed and supported by their peers and thought they were treated fairly and respected during their time in 4-H workshops. 100% of participants claimed they had fun and enjoyed their experience in 4-H workshops, of which 66% felt that 4-H staff helped them to see new opportunities. 66% of participants felt like their ideas were heard and respected by 4-H staff while the remaining 33% did not understand the question being asked.

## 5+ Session Youth Thriving Survey Results

145 participants ages 7-12 and 2 participants ages 13 and up (n=147) attended a 4-H workshop series with 5+ sessions (hours) of direct contact. For participants ages 7-12, 41% were male, 48% were female, 2% felt their gender identity was not accurately depicted among answer options, 6% did not want to disclose gender, and 4% chose not to answer. For ethnicity, 32% were Hispanic or Latinx, 25% were non-Hispanic or Latinx, 36% were unsure of their ethnicity, and 7% chose not to answer. For race, 2% were American Indian or Alaskan Natives, 10% were Asian, 19% were Black or African American, 15% were Caucasian, 9% were Multiracial, 26% did not know their race, and 19% chose not to disclose this information.

Of the 145 participants aged 7-12-years-old, 86% loved the content and activities in their respective workshops. 84% of participants felt safe in their 4-H workshops with 83% feeling welcomed, while 9% did not understand these questions and 3% chose not to answer. 79% of participants felt that 4-H staff helped them see new opportunities, with 9% not being sure and 3% not responding to this question. 88% of participants also reported that they were treated fairly by 4-H staff.

86% of participants felt that they were heard in their 4-H workshop while 85% felt that they were treated fairly. 90% of participants felt that they are capable of learning more, getting smarter by learning more, and that if they keep working towards a goal, they will get better. 85% of participants indicated that they have set goals for the future and that reaching those



goals is important to them. 81% of participants cared about the feelings of others, while 83% said they are happy to see others succeed.

For participants ages 13+, 50% were female and the remaining 50% chose not to identify gender. For ethnicity, 50% of participants were Hispanic or Latinx while the other 50% were non-Hispanic or Latinx. For race, 50% of participants were Caucasian while the remaining 50% were Multiracial.

100% of participants – aged 13+ years old – were passionate about the subject matter in the workshops they participated in. 100% of participants felt that they were treated fairly, taken seriously, and respected by the 4-H staff in their workshops. Survey data denoted differences in attitude and feelings before and after workshop completion; 50% of participants reported that they felt that they could increase their intellect and abilities by constantly practicing their interests. Original answers reported were 'Not True' prior to these workshops and 'Very True' after workshop completion. A 50% increase was also noted in respondent willingness to try new things – even if not good at the beginning of respective tasks; results after these workshops were 100% 'Very True'. Before and after these workshops, 100% of participants reported that they were excited for their respective futures, trusted their futures would turn out well, and that they will make a difference in the world; overall no change in these areas. Overall, there were notable differences in participant views and emotions relating to personal development, however, the small sample size for this grouping and survey type should be noted.

## Closing

The 2020-2021 program year is the first time this evaluation plan has been implemented. The pilot phase of this plan will allow 4-H professionals to gather information in order to better serve children, youth and families. Moving forward this might look like increasing topic options offered in schools, community centers, and library workshops; attending more community events for outreach purposes; and building strong partnerships with other community organizations. Based on these surveys and feedback from the Evaluation Coordinator, the surveys will be modified in order to capture more concise data.
