### **Research Center and Demonstration Orchard**

The Research Center and Demonstration Orchard located in North Las Vegas is overseen by the University of Nevada, Reno and is part of the larger Center for Urban Water Conservation. Three government entities use this space: UNR, UNLV and the City of North Las Vegas. For 25 years the universities have been growing plants and demonstrating how this can be done with lower water usage. Each is growing a variety of plant species, testing to see what will grow well in the Mojave Desert. The data collected during this research is then used in publications put out by these universities.

The center is located at 4600 Horse Drive and is a research facility. Master Gardeners and community volunteers harvest the produce, weigh and record the amounts under the supervision of university staff. Over a number of years that data is used to evaluate the plant's performance. The plant health and its susceptibility to disease or pests is also monitored. That data is used to evaluate our fruit and nut trees and grape vines in our largest publication, "*The University of Nevada, Reno Extension Research Orchard Fruit Tree Evaluation and Recommendations for Southern Nevada*". This pdf publication is available on the UNR Extension website, (extension.unr.edu).

The Demonstration Orchards have 544 fruit trees, the oldest having been planted in 1997 and they are still producing fruit! There are 24 varieties of fruit and nut trees. Harvest usually starts in June with apricots, apriums, and peaches being the first to ripen. Peaches continue through the summer with varieties that are early season as well as those that ripen mid and late summer. These are followed by plums and pluots in June and July. They are joined by plumcots, Pluerry, cherry plums, nectaplums, peacotum, nectarines, figs, almonds, fresh hops, and herbs. Apple varieties are ready in mid-summer and then others are later in the early fall. The end of summer brings on persimmons, quince and the early pomegranates. Alternate years, dates from the date palm tree are available. Harvests go into the fall with pomegranates, sometimes into late November or even December depending upon the weather.

The end of July and the first weeks of August is grape harvest time. Over 200 grape vines in 17 different varietals, including both table and wine grapes are grown at the center and are available to home winemakers and local wineries. A university research study on grapes has been conducted since 2016, examining different drought tolerant rootstocks for two varietals of wine grapes; Syrah and Colombard. The study took a look at how external stressors affect the crop. These included measured observations of vine health and fruit development for various amounts of water applied, vine performance under extreme high temperatures and varying degrees of soil salinity and protection of the fruit using several different pruning techniques.

The Research Center and Demonstration Orchard also includes 100 palm trees and twelve large vegetable beds. One of those beds is devoted to asparagus, one to hops, one for herbs, another to flowers for the pollinators and half of one for artichokes. The remainder get planted with cool or warm season varieties of vegetables. The warm season vegetables that have been planted are peppers, both sweet and hot, eggplant, tomatoes, cucumbers, a large variety of squash, sweet and ornamental corn, pole beans, okra, garlic, potatoes, spring and bulb onions. Cool season crops include a variety of greens, peas, beets, carrots, broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, and many Asian varieties. Varieties change depending upon what is available and what new crop warrants testing. No till methods, companion planting, integrated pest management, growing in the shade vs full sun, addition of different compost or mulch covering, and crop rotation are practices that are embraced at the center. It is all about testing things out!

So, what does the center do with all of this produce, you might be wondering? Since they are open year-round to the public, a farm stand is in effect where produce can be sampled and purchased. Deliveries are made to immune compromised seniors. Bakers use the fruit in their pastries and any excess goes to local food banks. Hours of operation are 8 a.m. to noon on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays. Come visit, get your garden, backyard vineyard or orchard questions answered, load up some wood-chip mulch and get some delicious produce!
