

MEMBER'S GUIDE

4-H DAIRY GOAT RECORD

Records are a curiosity cure. You may have many questions concerning the amount of time and money spent on your goat(s). Records can help you organize your time, budget your money and make important decisions.

Inventory is to list the animals and equipment you have on hand. The feed record allows you to keep track of types of feed fed and the cost of each. Breeding and kidding records are very important where buying, selling, milk production and showing are involved. The milk record is necessary as production of the doe is important to you because of prospective buyers. The business record helps you remember where, when and to whom your goats and kids are going or coming from. The importance of the health and account records is described in the paragraphs accompanying these pages. At the end of the project year, all this material can be summarized on the Financial Summary (page 8), and your experiences can be summarized on an additional page which asks for your experiences during the year.

There are many records contained in this publication. They are all important, but your leader or county agent will determine which need to be kept to fulfill the requirements for completion of a 4-H Dairy Goat Project. Be sure to bring your records with you to every meeting so any problems may be discussed with other members and with your leader.

Curiosity and asking questions are the keys to learning new things. Records can help you satisfy your curiosity while developing questions that ask, "What will *make the best better*?"

Footnote: This is intended to reflect yearly operating expenses. Capital Inventory like pens, housing, feeders, is included in the financial statement.

OPERATING EXPENSES

DESCRIPTION OF EXPENSES

FEED (C): The cost of all feed and bedding used must be accounted for, even if homegrown. Monthly pasture charges should be included. Also, list salt, mineral, protein supplement, milk replacer, etc.

<u>VETERINARY (D):</u> The cost of veterinary services and supplies are included, such as veterinary work done, and medicines or vaccines you used yourself.

<u>LIVESTOCK PURCHASED (E):</u> The cost of animals purchased during the project year are recorded in this column.

MISCELLANEOUS EXPENSES (F): This should include the cost of equipment purchased, supplies, registration fees, utilities, repairs, interest, disbudding, breeding, hoof trimming, marketing, transportation, bedding, brand inspection, entry fees, housing, health certificates, etc.

**NOTE: Quantities must be described, such as 2-50 lb. sacks, or 3 tons.

ANIMAL HEALTH RECORD

The health record is very important when making the decision to cut back the herd, and to keep track of potential herd health hazards, such as abscesses, which spread very rapidly through a herd. The date is important to include because if your goat(s) has a relapse of the same illness, you will want to know how long ago it had been treated. Under remarks, list symptoms noted and how long after symptoms were first noted was treatment begun, if applicable. Not all symptoms require treatment. For example: going off feed is a symptom something is wrong, but it may be a very hot day and the goat just doesn't feel like eating. Also list things such as blood tests taken for brucellosis, or milk samples tested for bacteria counts or cell counts. Dehorning, disbudding, castration, and teat removal should be included as well.
