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4-H Supports Youth Mental Health

In August we are going back to school, wrapping up summer plans, and resting before we dive into a busy time of year. This is an appropriate time to visit the topic of mental health.

What do we mean by "mental health"? Mental health includes emotional, psychological, and social well-being. It affects how we think, feel, and act. It also helps to determine how we handle stress, relate to

others, and make decisions. Biological factors, life experiences, and environments all contribute to mental health challenges.

Youth overall are resilient and healthy. But health is more than physical wellness. 1 in 6 U.S. youth aged 6-17 experience mental illness each year (National Association on Mental Illness [NAMI], 2021). Depression and anxiety are prevalent across the nation and suicide has become an epidemic – it is the second leading cause of death for people aged 10-34 in the United

States (National Institute of Mental Health, 2019).

It is not always apparent that youth are dealing with mental health disorders. Youth experiencing mental health challenges come from varied socio-economic, cultural, and demographic backgrounds. Be aware of and implement strategies that acknowledge intersectionality and the whole child. This means acknowledging their family background, financial situation, race, ethnicity, religious affiliation, etc. You know the youth in your programs, if they are acting differently speak up or ask them how they are doing. Consider that some youth face the same situation in different ways and require different forms of support.

What can we do? It's critical for adults to look out for opportunities to support the youth in our community as they work through these challenges. If youth gather the courage to share that they are having a hard time, treat that vulnerability with respect and care. Affirm they are not alone and processing feelings can be taxing. Provide support by listening, creating a sense of belonging, and behaving as role models.

Role model behavior includes understanding the power of language. Language that feeds the stigma around mental health, such as "crazy", "psycho", "nuts", "insane", "lunatic", etc. can perpetuate the

negative stigma. Use of person-first language - e.g., "a child with a mental health disorder" (National Alliance on Mental Illness, 2017). Recognize the validity of multiple perspectives and strive to think openly and inclusively. Speak up if you hear or see negative stereotyping related to mental health and try to avoid negative language in your 4-H space. Help all youth feel welcome by considering "Universal Design" strategies in your project. Universal Design is easier than you might think – it's all about recognizing that we

all learn in different ways. For example, don't just give instructions verbally, also have them written down or model instructions for those youth who may not learn as well verbally (Support for Families of Children with Disabilities).

Youth feel a sense of safety when we respond to their behavior, choose our words carefully, and offer activities that include multiple learning methods. These may seem like small steps, but each one supports better mental health. Together we can make a world of difference for youth in 4-H.

The other remaining 4-H series livestock contest is the **Lyon County Livestock Judging Contest**, part of the Silver State Youth Livestock Show, on August 15, 2024 at the Lyon County Fairgrounds.

The primary goal of the Contest is to demonstrate how to recognize and interpret visual differences between livestock animals and to understand livestock production and management practices. These are valuable skills for youth to learn, comprehend, and utilize.

There are two divisions for Judging, 4-H Division and FFA, Grange, or Independent Youth Division. Each division has three age categories (age, as of January 1, 2024): Junior (ages 9 to 10 years old), Intermediate (11 to 13 years old), and Senior (14 to 19 years old).

High Point Individual Awards in each division and age category will be given. High Point Team Awards in each division and age category will be given.

In order to qualify for series awards, participants must participate in one series contest and the Nevada State 4-H Contest held at Expo September 20-21.

Market and breeding shows are open to all individuals between the ages of 9 and 18 from Nevada and surrounding states. Unless specified in rules.

Youth ages 5 - 8 may show in Breeding shows and Showmanship with parent/guardian supervision. Peewees must Pre-enter. No day of show entries will be accepted



All exhibitors must be currently enrolled in a 4-H, FFA, Grange program, or meet SSYLS requirements for Independent exhibitors. Exhib-

itors must own and be in possession of their lamb, goat or swine for 60 days or beef for 120 days prior to the opening date of the fair. Rabbits and poultry must be owned and in possession of their animals 30 days prior to fair.

Dry Camping areas are available to exhibitors. It must be payed for through the online entry system with your entries. Please Note: no hookups for water or sewer are available.

The deadline for entering is August 1, 2024. All Classes <u>must</u> be entered online. No written/mailed entries will be accepted.

- 3. Protect yourself from smoke if you must stay outdoors to reduce the health impacts from smoke exposure.


