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4-H Equity for Youth Living in Poverty

Through the commitment to youth across the country, 4-H strives to bring more equitable opportunities to youth of all ages. This is to close the opportunity gap for marginalized communities to help them thrive and flourish through 4-H programming. The 4-H Program Leaders Working Group, Access, Equity, and Belonging Committee (AEBC) has joined with the 4-H Thriving Model Taskforce to ensure this

nationally adopted model is explored and utilized through an equity lens. The following explores the Thriving Model in relation to youth living in poverty.

Youth living in poverty need greater support to increase their ability and capacity to thrive in a positive way. There are almost 12 million youth living in poverty. And of those children, approximately 30 percent are African American, 29 percent are American Indian/ Alaska Native, 23.7 percent are Hispanic/ Latin X and about 9 percent are white (Children's Defense Fund 2018). Children living in poverty are more apt to

experience adverse living conditions that may lead to poor showing academically, physical health issues, a strained ability to manage emotions, and social exhaustion. These children may feel devalued and set aside by society, which can then impede their abilities to thrive and achieve an alternative future to poverty.

Fostering youth belonging in 4-H requires that youth professionals take on the vital role of understanding and responding to the social conditions by honoring their assets and help them overcome barriers. These skills are from the 4-H Professional Research, Knowledge, and Competencies (United States Department of Agriculture 2017).

Become Aware

- Understand one's own implicit bias and acknowledge any affects it may have on their values and assumptions.
- Show self-awareness for values, norms, and myths about those living in poverty.

• Understand trauma and how it affects the neurodevelopment of youth living in poverty.

Develop Programs

- Build relationships of trust, safety, and mutual respect.
- Utilize communication methods that are reaching families living in poverty.
- Involve youth when and how they show up.

Support Youth

- Actively listen to youth and give them the safe space to "tell their story" without judgment or assumptions.
- Design learning environments, curriculum materials and resources that support the thriving of youth in poverty.

Identify Barriers

- Recognize and reduce barriers to accessing programs for those living in poverty.
- Recognize youth in poverty as valued young people and contributors to their own pathway.

Another critical part of reaching youth living in poverty is to build community relationships and partners with organizations that have a positive reputation for serving these populations. This is essential to build trust and rapport with families in the area. Autonomously funded youth serving organizations historically do an exceptional job at engaging low-income youth audiences. This can be done through conducting interviews with members and leaders in the community to identify what matters most to the youth and families in their area. And another positive step to build these relations is entering into agreements with community partners to create a collaborative approach to working with the underserved populations.

Lastly, in making these opportunities worthwhile and effective, is by evaluation of the program efforts as time goes on. It may come as a challenge because of the stressful situations the youth are living in. The

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2024-2025 4-H Year has Begun

The new 4-H year (2024-2025) begins October 1, 2024. One of the things that this includes is 4-H Online re-enrollment for all 4-H members, Cloverbuds and Leaders.

Enrollment for last year ended on September 30. There will be a week when 4-H Online is not accessible. The current plan is to start re-enrollment on October 7, 2024.

If you have been enrolled in Nevada before, you do not need to create a new profile. All of your information from the previous year is still in 4-H Online. Program ages and years in a program are automatically updated. However, families are responsible for updating grade levels, and changes in schools.

This is an opportunity to change or add clubs and projects if necessary. Families can make those changes themselves until the new enrollment is submitted for approval. After that, the 4-H Online Manager has to make that change.

consistency and predictability of their attendance would be the most difficult to deal with. But keeping an open line of communication with the youth when they are in attendance may shed light on what is going on. Evaluating the programs face to face with the youth will also allow them to have a voice in the programs and may lead to more important insight as to what they may want in the future. Letting them have a voice will engage and grow their sense of belonging, which would hopefully keep them actively involved for time to come in 4-H.





2024 STEM Challenge Introduced

It's here! The 2024 4-H STEM Challenge, Food for Thought, is now available. The 2024 kit provides young people with a hands on experience as they explore food security and its impact on the world, empowering them to innovate and create positive change in their communities.

Developed by Council and 4-H educators from LSU AgCenter, North Dakota State University, Penn State Extension, and the University of Nebraska Lincoln, the new STEM Challenge is a collection of three activities that engage kids in learning



Food Fighters: This collaborative board game gamifies learning about the global food supply chain. Students work together to secure their town's food supply, making strategic decisions and building teamwork skills.

Chew on This: This entrepreneurial challenge encourages students to think critically about food waste reduction. By brainstorming innovative uses for food scraps, students develop problem-solving and design thinking skills.

Know to Grow: This hands-on engineering activity introduces students to plant science and controlled environment agriculture. Students design and build efficient growing environments, fostering an understanding of plant cultivation and its role in food security.
