4-H Commitment to Youth Experiencing Homelessness

4-H Youth

Development

4-H welcomes all youth, and our commitment to equity, accessibility, and diversity provides essential support to youth in our community – support many youth may lack outside our programs. This

includes the 1.39 million youth experiencing homelessness identified by schools in the United States (National Center for Homeless Education, 2021).

How do we define "homeless"?

Youth experiencing homelessness (YEH) are broadly defined as children and young people who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence. This could include youth living in homeless shelters and transitional housing, hotels or motels, and

unsheltered settings; and those who are couch surfing, doubling up, or sharing housing with others due to a loss of housing, natural disaster, economic hardship, running away or being kicked out from home, or a similar reason.

What challenges does this group of youth face?

Youth experiencing homelessness may not have access to clean clothing, hygiene materials, school supplies, or a safe environment. It is not always possible to accurately identify youth in these circumstances from appearance alone. Homelessness can affect youth from any background including rural and urban environments, varied socio-economic, cultural, and demographic backgrounds. Certain populations of youth are at a disproportionately higher risk for experiencing homelessness, specifically youth of color (Black/African American - 83% higher than other races; Hispanic - 33% higher than non-Hispanic youth); lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer youth (LGBTQ, 120% higher compared to heterosexual and cisgender youth); and youth who are parents (200% higher than non-parenting peers) (Morton et al, 2017).



How can we provide support?

First, remember that youth experiencing homelessness may be missing basic needs. We can support them by providing information or access

> to transportation, bringing all supplies required to program, or ensuring basic needs are met during program such as access to food, clean clothes, or sanitation.

We all benefit from creating a safe, inclusive space for youth to participate in 4-H programs. Youth get the space they need to build relationships and develop. Program leaders get engagement and trust from youth in 4-H programs. Our community gets a wider range of dedicated, educated

Why an Equity Lens?

4-H has made a bold commitment to youth across the United States: to reflect the population demographics, vulnerable populations, diverse needs, and social conditions of the country

Making good on these promises requires that all those working with youth in 4-H critically analyze current programs and deliver those programs through an equity lens. Administrators, professionals, volunteers, and stakeholders have a responsibility to be aware of and confront the disparities that exist within 4-H programs and in society. Doing so is critical because those who aim to develop youth without acknowledgment of and response to a young person's possible societal inequities is perpetuating injustice

The 4-H Thriving Model (Arnold, 2018) describes the process of positive youth development in 4-H. We should explore the 4-H Thriving Model, our national theoretical framework, with the same level of critical review to ensure it guides our work with equity and social justice at the forefront.

Shooting Sports Volunteer Certification

Nevada 4-H Shooting Sports Volunteer Certification will be in Logandale, Nevada on December 7, 2024

This program is endorsed by the University of Nevada, Reno Extension, and meets the educational training requirements to serve as a 4-H Shooting Sports volunteer leader within Nevada. In accordance



with respective state policies, 4-H Shooting Sports instructors at the county level must: be 21 years of age, {Junior Instructors must be

at least 14 years old and Assistant Instructors are between 18 to 20 years old.} and be screened, trained, and appointed as a current 4-H Leader through their local County Extension Office. They must successfully complete a prescribed series of Extension approved/sanctioned instructor training. Be trained and authorized for each discipline(s) that they are teaching at the county level.

Training Information:

Youth Development/Risk Management Required Training:

To complete this portion of the training, you will go to <u>www.4hshootingsportscollege.com</u> to complete four online modules. When you register for the training, you will receive a code to use. The fee for this course is included in the registration. These modules should take approximately 3-4 hours to complete. **They must be completed before the training.**

Everyone is required to complete a 4-hour Youth Development/Risk Management training every 2 years. If you attended a 4-H Shooting Sports certification training in 2022 or 2023, then you will not need to complete this portion of the training again. If you have never attended a 4-H Shooting Sports certification training or attended prior to 2021, then you will need to complete this training.
