It's Important for Nevada 4-H to Participate in National Index Study

Nevada 4-H's engagement in the National 4-H Annual Index Study plays a vital role in advancing evidence-based youth development both within the state and across the nation. The study, now in its third consecutive year, is a key initiative spearheaded by the National 4-H Council in collaboration with

universities and Extension services to evaluate how 4-H programs are preparing youth for life and work. By participating, Nevada 4-H not only contributes to a national dialogue on youth outcomes but also gains access to detailed, comparative data that supports continuous program improvement.

The 2024 study included responses from over 3,250 youth across 19 states and focused on new dimensions of readiness, including physical and emotional health, productivity, engagement, and workforce preparedness, alongside traditional 4-H outcome areas like leadership, STEM, and college and career readiness. Nevada's previous participation in 2022 and 2023 demonstrates a commitment to shaping national benchmarks and aligning with the 4-H Thriving Model.

From a state-level perspective, the benefits of Nevada 4-H's participation are multi-faceted. First, the study provides baseline and trend data that can inform curriculum development, training, and resource allocation. For example, results show that youth with higher 4-H involvement exhibit stronger indicators of workplace readiness, emotional intelligence, and community engagement—key focus areas for Nevada's youth development strategies. The insights also reveal the role of adult mentorship, a cornerstone of Nevada 4-H programs, with over 85% of youth nationally affirming that 4-H adults expect them to do something positive with their lives.

Moreover, participation ensures that Nevada youth are represented in a national context, helping to identify demographic trends and equity gaps. For instance, data from all three reports confirm that youth across gender and racial identities experience 4-H

positively and that participation at the county level - which is often the primary point of contact in Nevada - is associated with the most significant developmental gains.

In conclusion, Nevada 4-H's involvement in the National Index Study is not just a reporting exercise—

it is a strategic investment in building a stronger, more resilient generation of youth. It empowers program leaders with the tools to evaluate impact, align with national best practices, and advocate for youth development funding and support. By anchoring local insights in a national framework, Nevada 4-H reinforces its leadership in the Cooperative

Extension System and its commitment to helping youth thrive.

Humboldt-Toiyabe Forest to Provide Capitol Christmas Tree

Every year, a different national forest is selected to provide a tree to appear on the west lawn of the U.S. Capitol building for the holiday season. Humboldt-Toiyabe National Forest in Nevada has been selected to provide the 2025 US Capital Christmas Tree

Theme for the 2025 U.S. Capitol Christmas Tree is Starry Skies to Neon Lights - Spirit of the Silver State. For the first time, "The People's Tree" will

be harvested here in Nevada, decorated by Nevadans and transported to our nation's capital for the holiday season.

The Forest Service is calling on Nevadans to craft thousands of handmade ornaments to decorate the Capitol Christmas Tree and accompanying smaller trees. This includes 3,500



brightly-colored ornaments, nine to twelve inches in size, that are weatherproof to withstand wind, rain, and snow. An additional 6,500 smaller ornaments, four to ten inches in size, will adorn the indoor trees and don't need to be weatherproof.

The Humbold-Toiyabe and partners will host ornament-making events throughout the year. Look for an event or craft and submit an ornament on your own. The US Capitol Christmas Tree site (https://www.uscapitolchristmastree.com/) features ornament examples and how-to guides. Ideas for interpreting the 2025 theme include:

- Uniquely Nevada- capture the spirit of "Home Means Nevada"
- Iconic landscapes and special places in Nevada
- Multiple use and how Nevadans enjoy their public lands
- The wild plants, animals, and geology of Nevada
- Smokey Bear and Woodsy Owl

Create your ornament using natural, recyclable, and repurposed materials. Don't use sharp materials that could pose a danger or interfere with tree lighting. Ornaments may not include commercial logos or be divisive or offensive. Ornaments cannot be returned.

The deadline to submit ornaments is September 15, 2025. Drop them off at any Humboldt-Toiyabe National Forest office (go to https://www.fs.usda.gov/r04/humboldt-toiyabe/offices for locations) or mail them to:

Camp is Coming: What to Bring

Northern Area/Western 4-H Camp will be starting in five weeks. Now would be a good time to go over the list of **Things to Bring** that is included in your registration packet. This is a list that you can depend on to get your camper through the week smoothly.

Tahoe weather can change quickly. Whereas the days may be hot, nights can dip into the 40s or 50s, so

Weekend Summer Camp for Youth

Youth 11-14 years old can spend three days at a camp designed for the outdoors. The Maison T Ortiz Youth Outdoor Skills Camp is designed for youth who may not have opportunities to experience Nevada's outdoors. The camp offers skills training in fishing, archery, pellet shooting and shotgun, wildlife tracks identification, and outdoor crafts. There is also Survival and Orienteering, and trail safety instruction.

The camp is July 18-20. It is held at the Winnemucca Ranch, which is 35 miles north of Reno/Sparks off the Pyramid Lake Highway. The fee is \$50, Scholarships are available. This session has openings but Registration will end on June 7, 2025.

Please Note:

Effective June 1, 2025, the ban on all Nevada poultry (birds and eggs) and dairy cattle exhibitions at fairs and shows will be lifted.

Although Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) has been detected across Nevada since last November, the most recent outbreak has plateaued, with no new detections in the state during the past two months. All northern Nevada premises have been cleared of quarantine. Given this current trend in Nevada concerning HPAI, the Nevada Department of Agriculture (NDA) is lifting the ban on Nevada poultry and dairy shows.

With the termination of the ban on Nevada poultry and dairy shows, the NDA stresses the importance of management to implement heightened biosecurity measures while hosting shows and exhibitions.
