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State 4-H Recognizes Volunteers and Teens at Expo

Nevada State 4-H Expo was held in Fallon, NV this September 25-28. Along with the many contests and displays, the Nevada State 4-H office presented awards for Volunteer of the Year, Youth Adult Partnership (YAP), and Teen Leader of the Year.

Here are basic bios on the Award winners:

2025 Volunteer of the Year – Joe Nenzel

Joe received multiple nominations for his outstanding commitment to the 4-H program and the youth it serves. As Head of Shooting Sports for Douglas

County, his title reflects leadership, but his true distinction lies in presence. Joe attends every practice, not just to oversee, but to actively engage, teach, and mentor. Every Saturday, he devotes his entire day to rifle instruction, ensuring each participant receives thoughtful, hands-on guidance. As the season winds down, he adds Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday evenings to his schedule. His reliability is a powerful example of service with purpose.

Joe's impact extends beyond the range. He builds lasting relationships with youth, encouraging growth in both skill and confidence. When participants receive hunting tags, he doesn't just offer advice – he helps identify hunting areas and offers to guide them. His passion for the outdoors is matched by patience, kindness, and integrity. By teaching firearm safety and responsible hunting, Joe instills lifelong values in every young person he mentors. He does not seek recognition; he simply shows up week after week because he believes in the mission of 4-H and in the potential of every youth.

One participant shared, "Joe opened the door to opportunities I never knew existed. As someone from a single-parent household, I can say that Coach Joe's kindness and consistency gave me something deeply meaningful – perhaps the closest I'll come to having a strong, supportive father figure. His belief in me changed my life."

While we celebrate Joe, we also recognize Dawn. Together, Joe and Dawn have built one of the strongest 4-H Shooting Sports programs in the county over

the past 13 years. Their club has the highest youth participation and resource leader involvement in Douglas County, and they make it possible for youth to participate at no cost. The program runs four days a week, often without a free weekend. While Joe is on the range coaching, Dawn works tirelessly behind the scenes to keep everything running smoothly. They coordinate with families, adjust to schedules, and create opportunities for as many youths as possible. Each year, more than 30 of their participants compete at

Expo, many earn top placements.

Joe and Dawn's shared dedication has created not just a program, but a community. Their leadership, generosity, and belief in youth embody the very best of 4-H.

2025 Youth Adult Partnership (YAP) Award – Alvin Adelhoch

Alvin volunteers with two shooting sports clubs in Clark County, serving as the club leader for the Silver State Shooters and as a co-leader with the 4-H Vegas Rangers. In both roles, he prioritizes safety, carefully following

shooting sports procedures to ensure every youth stays safe on the range.

He is a consistent presence at meetings and practices, where he engages youth in archery and air pistol through thoughtful questions and hands-on guidance. Alvin's deep knowledge of equipment, paired with his fun and approachable teaching style, makes learning both enjoyable and effective.

What sets Alvin apart is the way he connects personally with youth. He knows each member by name, greets them warmly at practice, and takes time to ask about their week and lives outside of 4-H. This genuine interest builds trust and helps youth feel valued. Alvin is especially strong in one-on-one mentorship, spending time needed to help each participant succeed.

In the time he has been a 4-H volunteer, Alvin has proven himself to be a dedicated, knowledgeable, and personable leader. His contributions have been a true

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asset to the program and a positive influence on the youth he serves.

2025 Teen Leader of the Year – Harli Stumbaugh

Harli received multiple nominations for this award, reflecting her outstanding dedication and the respect she has earned within the 4-H community. For the past two years as a teen leader, she has embodied the heart of 4-H. Harli arrives early at every practice, stays until the end, and is always ready to help with a positive attitude. Her initiative, reliability, and willingness to step up inspire those around her.

As a senior member of her club, Harli has been a role model and mentor to younger participants. She leads with patience, kindness, and a willingness to share her knowledge, creating an environment where youth feel comfortable seeking guidance and support. In shooting sports, Harli plays an integral role in running the range alongside adult leaders. She delivers the safety brief at each practice and assists with instruction, contributing her skills in shotgun, air rifle, and .22 rifle. Her commitment is exceptional – she has attended nearly every practice this year, missing only once to fill her Antelope tag, which reflects both her dedication to 4-H and her personal growth as an outdoorswoman.

Most importantly, Harli lives the 4-H pledge each day. She leads with her head, making wise decisions and thinking critically. She serves with her heart, treating others with compassion and respect. She works with her hands, putting in the effort to make a difference. And she values her health, modeling balance and well-being for her peers. Harli exemplifies the spirit of 4-H and is a shining example of what a teen leader should be.

2025-2026 4-H Year has Begun

The new 4-H year (2025-2026) begins October 1, 2025. One of the things that this includes is 4-H Online re-enrollment for all 4-H members, Cloverbuds and Leaders.

Enrollment for last year ended on September 30. On October 1-3, 4-H Online will be making minor changes to different parts of the site. It is requested



that you wait until at least October 4 before re-enrolling. If you reenroll before then, you risk missing some updates.

If you have been enrolled in Nevada before,

you do not need to create a new profile. All of your information from the previous year is still in 4-H Online. Program ages and years in a program are automatically updated. Families are responsible for updating grade levels, and changes in schools.

This is an opportunity to change or add clubs and projects if necessary. Families can make those changes themselves until the new enrollment is submitted for approval. After that, the 4-H Online Manager has to make that change.

In **Douglas County** the deadline to turn in record books to the Extension Office is Friday, October 10, 2025 by 5:00 p.m.

NASA IntroducesTechRise Student Challenge

NASA is introducing the TechRise Student Challenge – a FREE NASA challenge for middle and high schools. This exciting opportunity in your community opens in September and invites student teams in sixth-12th grade to submit experiment ideas to fly on a commercial space industry suborbital flight (e.g., rocket, high-altitude balloon).

The NASA TechRise Student Challenge empowers teams of sixth to 12th-grade



students to design, build, and launch experiments on NASA-supported test flights. Guided by an educator, student teams affiliated with U.S. public, private, and charter schools can submit ideas for experiments to test on a NASA-sponsored flight. Sixty winning teams will be selected to receive \$1,500 to build their experiment, technical support from Future Engineers, and an assigned spot on a NASA-sponsored flight for their experiment.

No experience is needed. The challenge includes information sessions for your department or organization upon request, free educational resources to foster classroom learning and an exciting student virtual field trip in the fall. Sixty winning teams will also receive \$1500 to build their experiment, a spot to test it on a

NASA-sponsored flight, and technical support from NASA TechRise advisors. The challenge is a great way to get hands-on with a NASA project this school year, and we encourage teams of all skill levels to apply.
